was great for us, but hopefully even great for the survival of our wild trout. Now we need more moisture to fill our creeks, rivers, swamps, and wetlands.

Our early season focus has been on our WRTU Chapter Expo. We made a bold move and shifted the event to Flat Creek Lodge in Hayward, Wisconsin. The reason behind this move was when I mapped out all our 284

WRTU members across the seven counties, it became evident to the WRTU Board members that we need to try holding the Expo in other locations. It turned out to be the right decision. I personally thank all the efforts of our WRTU Board members, conservation exhibitors, speakers, manufacturers' sales reps, and all the wonderful attendees.

This past February we had a Zoom meeting with Nate Thomas (WI-DNR fishery biologist) who discussed his White River Creel Survey for 2024 – 2025. To keep costs down, the WI-DNR has purchased several trail cameras. The cost was \$9,000 and WRTU Chapter donated half of the cost (\$4,500). The WI-DNR creel survey signage includes the WRTU Chapter logo. It will be interesting to see how many fishermen will go up to the cameras along various access points on the White River and briefly give your fish catch report. Please help the WI-DNR with your reporting.

Last, I want to mention WRTU Chapter is looking into youth and women fly casting outings with the help of Larry Mann and Wendy Williamson. Our future depends on getting more young adults and

### **Introducing Knot Talk!**

If you fish, you tie knots. The two go hand in hand. Knots attach flies to the ends of our lines. They attach tippet to our leaders... Knots are great. But it turns out, they are not all equally great.

There are dozens of fishing knots out there. What knots do you use? Why those? Are they easier or faster to tie? Stronger? Do they use up (waste) less line? Is your go-to knot what you grew up using?

I tied the same knot for almost five decades to attach everything to my line. I know it works as I've landed thousands of fish and pulled my gear off thousands of snags. But I started wondering how good was my knot? How did it compare with other knots I could be using instead?

To satisfy my curiosity, I put together a knot testing system I named Knot Broke. With it I can measure the breaking strength of lines, and knots. So, I've been testing, and learning so much along the way. I'll share neat knot data and info I've learned in future articles. Spoiler alert.... I tie different knots now than I used to!

Knot testing results as of April '24. Testing has been done with

Rio Powerflex tippet, 5X which is rated at 5 lbs. Each knot is tested 10 times, tied carefully, and lubricated before cinching tight. The summary in the chart here shows the knot tested, and its average breaking strength. ### Wild Rivers TU Chapter Goes Into the Schools

In March and April members of the Wild Rivers volunteered in Sandra Naas' biology class at Ashland High School. Dick Berge, Frank Pratt and Bob Traczyk rotated as instructors to about 25 students.

The instructors started with the basic principles of threading a hook shank, and showed the students the basic tools we use in fly tying. The kids learned how to work a vise, use a bobbin, load thread in a bobbin, and perform a half hitch to save the materials that had been attached to the hook shank.

The fly patterns ran the gamut starting with the woolly bugger and ending with a dry fly. Frank taught the lead-free turkey leech that would leave traditionalists with their jaws dropped. And the class is not over yet because we have fly casting in a week (April 17th) and then in May the flies will get tested on the trout at Les Voigt Hatchery.



# Sparkle Dun

Many of us dry fly fishermen look forward to the April showers which help encourage *Ephemerella subvaria*, the Hendrickson to emerge. After a long Winter there is nothing like seeing those gray winged mayflies sailing down our northern trout streams. We are so lucky that we have the early catch and release season. Otherwise, during warmer years we might not get to experience this wonderful hatch.

My favorite dry fly pattern for the Hendrickson hatch is the Comparadun or Sparkle Dun. This fly pattern has proven to be a deadly pattern for me when the trout are looking up. I tie it two ways, either with a zelon shuck at the tail (Sparkle Dun style) or with just stiff hackle fibers for the tail (Comparadun style). The key to tying it is using the right deer hair to make the upright wing silhouette and to help the fly float better. The best floatant I have found for the Comparadun fly pattern is Dry Magic, it really works well even after a fish have been chumping on it. Works even better than Frog's Fanny Floatant for this pattern.

For tying instructions for the Comparadun or Sparkle dun fly pattern do a search on YouTube. There are many great how to tie videos for the Comparadun fly pattern.


